SUMMARIZED ITINERARY

Day 1, July 1

Arrival in Lima and transfer to the hotel. Overnight Lima.

Day 2, July 2

Flight to Puerto Maldonado. Transfer to the hotel. Birding in the afternoon around La Pastora Road. Overnight Cabaña Quinta Hotel, Puerto Maldonado.

Day 3, July 3

Birding around Puerto Maldonado and transfer by boat to Refugio Amazonas. Tambopata National Reserve. Overnight Refugio Amazonas Lodge, Tambopata.

Day 4 - 6 July 4 - 6

Full days at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge (including forest trails, river boat and oxbow lake).

Day 7, July 7

Flight to Cusco. Explore Huacarpay Lake and transfer to Ollantaytambo. Overnight Ollantaytambo.

Day 8, July 8

Transfer to Aguas Calientes. Visit Machu Picchu. Overnight Aguas Calientes.

Day 9, July 9

Birding around Puente Ruinas. Transfer back to Cusco. Overnight Cusco.

Day 10, July 10

Start birding the Manu Road with transfer from Cusco to Paucartambo, Acjanaco and Wayquecha Biological Station. Overnight Wayquecha Biological Station.

Day 11, July 11

Birding Wayquecha, Rocotal and the Cock of the Rock Lodge. Overnight Cock of the Rock Lodge.

Day 12, July 12

Birding around the Cock of the Rock Lodge and Rocotal. Overnight Cock of the Rock Lodge.

Day 13, July 13

Birding between the Cock of the Rock Lodge and Atalaya. Visit the Villa Carmen Biological Station. Overnight Cock of the Rock Lodge.

Day 14, July 14

Birding below the Cock of the Rock Lodge, Quita Calzón and Villa Carmen. Overnight Cock of the Rock Lodge.

Day 15, July 15

Birding above the Cock of the Rock Lodge and transfer back to Cusco. Overnight Cusco.

Day 16, July 16

Fly to Lima. Visit the Ventanilla marshes. Overnight Lima.

POST-EXTENSION

Day 17, July 17

Explore the Santa Eulalia Road. Overnight Lima.

Day 18, July 18

Explore Marcapomacocha. Overnight Lima.

Day 19, July 19

Explore Puerto Viejo, Pucusana and Pantanos de Villa Wildlife Refuge. Overnight Lima.

Day 20, July 20

Explore Lomas de Lachay. Transfer back to the hotel. Overnight Lima.

Day 21, July 21

Departure.

TINAMIFORMES

Tinamidae

Brown Tinamou *Crypturellus obsoletus* Superb views of this shy and seldom-seen forest tinamou in the garden of the Cock of the Rock Lodge, seen on consecutive days

Black-capped Tinamou (H) *Crypturellus atrocapillus* This very hard-to-find Tinamou was heard several times at Villa Carmen. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Little Tinamou (H) Crypturellus soui Heard at Refugio Amazonas

Variegated Tinamou (H) Crypturellus variegatus Heard at Refugio Amazonas

Undulated Tinamou (H) Crypturellus undulatus Heard at Refugio Amazonas

Andean Tinamou *Nothoprocta pentlandii* A party of at least seven birds was seen well along the main track at Lomas de Lachay. Here the subspecies *oustaleti*

ANSERIFORMES

Anhimidae

Horned Screamer (H) *Anhima cornuta* Unfortunately only heard at Refugio Amazonas **Anatidae**

Torrent Duck *Merganetta armata* One of the classics of the Andes. Several couples were seen along the Urubamba River on the way to Aguas Calientes. Here the subspecies *turneri*

Andean Goose Chloephaga melanoptera Several were seen in the Marcapomacocha area.

Muscovy Duck Cairina moschata Seen in the Tambopata National Reserve

Yellow-billed Teal Anas flavirostris Seen at Huacarpay Lake

Yellow-billed Pintail Anas georgica Seen at Huacarpay Lake

Puna Teal Anas puna Seen at Huacarpay Lake

Cinnamon Teal Anas *cyanoptera* Seen at Pantanos de Villa and Puerto Viejo. Here the subspecies *orinoma*

White-cheeked Pintail *Anas bahamensis* Seen at Pantanos de Villa and Puerto Viejo. Here the subspecies *rubirostris*

Andean Duck Oxyura ferruginea Seen at Pantanos de Villa

GALLIFORMES

Cracidae

Speckled Chachalaca *Ortalis guttata* Seen at the Refugio Amazonas and Cock of the Rock Lodges

Spix's Guan *Penelope jacquacu* Seen at Refugio Amazonas. Named after Johann Baptist von Spix, German naturalist, who discovered the now sadly extinct (in the wild) Spix's Macaw

Andean Guan *Penelope montagnii* Seen in the cloudforest below Wayquecha Biological Station

Odontophoridae

Rufous-breasted Wood Quail *Odontophorus speciosus* Two birds were seen well below the Cock of the Rock Lodge. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Stripe-faced Wood Quail (H) *Odontophorus balliviani* Almost! Despite all our efforts we had only shadows and glimpses in the thicket bushes at Pillahuata.

SPHENISCIFORMES



Spheniscidae

Humboldt Penguin *Spheniscus humboldti* Scope views of six individuals from the Pucusana stakeout. Named after Friedrich Wilhelm Karl Heinrich Alexander Baron von Humboldt (1769-1859), one of the greatest German explorers and scientists. This species is classified as vulnerable and is near-endemic.

PODICIPEDIFORMES

Podicipedidae

White-tufted Grebe Rollandia rolland Seen at Huacarpay Lake. Here the subspecies chilensis

Great Grebe Podiceps major Seen nicely in Puerto Viejo and Pantanos de Villa

Pied-billed Grebe *Podilymbus podiceps* One individual seen in the quiet waters of Pantanos de Villa

CICONIIFORMES

Ciconiidae

Wood Stork Mycteria americana Seen along the Tambopata River

PELECANIFORMES

Threskiornithidae

Green Ibis (H) Mesembrinibis cayennensis Heard near the Puerto Maldonado marshes

Puna Ibis *Plegadis ridgwayi* Several encounters at higher elevations and along the southern coast of Lima

Ardeidae

Fasciated Tiger Heron *Tigrisoma fasciatum* Seen along the Urubamba River during our way to Aguas Calientes

Black-crowned Night Heron Nycticorax nycticorax Seen at Pantanos de Villa

Striated Heron *Butorides striata* Common along rice fields in Rioja and Moyobamba. This bird is known for its bait-fishing practice, which consists in attracting fish by placing bait – insects, flowers, seeds, twigs, bread, even popcorn – on the water surface. The Striated Heron may also break off part of a twig to use for bait, making this bird not only one of the few toolusing animals, but one of the very few that actually make their tools.

Western Cattle Egret *Bubulcus ibis* Common along pastures and paddy fields. First recorded in the New World in 1877 (Suriname), it has since then spread through large sections of the hemisphere, even reaching islands such as the Galapagos.

Great Egret Ardea alba Several encounters

Snowy Egret Egretta thula Common

Little Blue Heron Egretta caerulea Two birds were seen at Pantanos de Villa.

Capped Heron *Pilherodius pileatus* This elegant bird was seen nicely along the Tambopata River.

Pelecanidae

Peruvian Pelican *Pelecanus thagus* Great views at the Pucusana harbor. This near-endemic species is listed as near-threatened.

SULIFORMES

Sulidae

Peruvian Booby *Sula variegata* It's always nice to see boobies fishing by plunge-diving, as we saw them in Pucusana. A near-endemic species, classified as near-threatened.

Phalacrocoracidae

Neotropic Cormorant *Phalacrocorax brasilianus* Common along the coast of Lima

Guanay Cormorant *Leucocarbo bougainvillii* Close-up views of three birds during the boat ride along Pucusana bay. The name comes from guano, which is the word used to refer to bird excrements used as fertilizer. From 1849 to 1870 guano was the most effective fertilizer



and Peru was the largest producer of guano, exporting between 10 and 12 million tons, mostly to the United Kingdom. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Red-legged Cormorant *Phalacrocorax gaimardi* Nice views from the Pucusana stakeout. The species is classified as near-threatened.

ACCIPITRIFORMES

Cathartidae

Black Vulture Coragyps atratus Numerous and widespread

Turkey Vulture *Cathartes aura* Another frequently encountered vulture, while soaring it typically shows the characteristic "dihedral" angle

Greater Yellow-headed Vulture *Cathartes melambrotus* Common in the lowlands **Accipitridae**

Grey-headed Kite *Leptodon cayanensis* Seen around the Refugio Amazonas Lodge Harpy Eagle *Harpia harpyja* An amazing sighting of this mythical bird at the active nest of the Refugio Amazonas Lodge. This is the national bird of Panama. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Plain-breasted Hawk *Accipiter ventralis* Good views of one bird soaring at Acjanaco on the upper Manu Road.

Plumbeous Kite *Ictinia plumbea* Common on the lowest parts of the Manu Road **Snail Kite** *Rostrhamus sociabilis* Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge. Here the nominate subspecies *sociabilis*

Great Black Hawk *Buteogallus urubitinga* Seen along the Tambopata River Roadside Hawk *Rupornis magnirostris* Seen in the lowlands Grey-lined Hawk *Buteo nitidus* Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge



Variable Hawk *Geranoaetus polyosoma* Seen well in the Andes

Harris's Hawk Parabuteo unicinctus Seen south of Lima

White-throated Hawk Buteo albigula Seen well at Pillahuata

Short-tailed Hawk Buteo brachyurus Seen soaring above Villa Carmen

Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle *Geranoaetus melanoleucus* Several juveniles were seen at Lomas de Lachay.

EURYPYGIFORMES

Sunbittern Eurypyga helias Seen in the lowlands. Here the subspecies meridionalis

GRUIFORMES

Rallidae

Grey-necked Wood Rail Aramides cajaneus Great views at Villa Carmen

Plumbeous Rail *Pardirallus sanguinolentus* Seen well at Huacarpay Lake. Here the subspecies *tschudii*

Purple Gallinule *Porphyrio martinicus* Seen well in the lowlands

Common Gallinule Gallinula galeata Common at several locations

Andean Coot Fulica ardesiaca Common at Puerto Viejo and Pantanos de Villa

Giant Coot Fulica gigantea Seen well below the Ticlio mountain pass

Aramidae

Limpkin Aramus guarauna Nice views at Villa Carmen

CHARADRIIFORMES

Burhinidae

Peruvian Thick-knee *Burhinus superciliaris* Several pairs were seen at the Ventanilla marshes near Lima airport.

Haematopodidae

Blackish Oystercatcher Haematopus ater Seen at Puerto Viejo beach

American Oystercatcher Haematopus palliatus Seen at Puerto Viejo and Paraiso

Recurvirostridae

Black-necked Stilt Himantopus mexicanus A few seen along the coast

Charadriidae

Andean Lapwing Vanellus resplendens Seen at higher elevations, where it is normally common

Southern Lapwing Vanellus chilensis Seen around Puerto Maldonado

Killdeer Charadrius vociferus Seen at Puerto Viejo

Semipalmated Plover Charadrius semipalmatus Seen well at the Ventanilla marshes

Diademed Plover *Phegornis mitchellii* Excellent views of this legendary bird at our usual place in the Marcapomacocha area. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Jacanidae

Wattled Jacana Jacana jacana Seen in the lowlands

Thinocoridae

Least Seedsnipe *Thinocorus rumicivorus* Excellent views of this handsome bird along the entrance track of Lomas de Lachay. Here the subspecies *cuneicauda*

Grey-breasted Seedsnipe *Thinocorus orbignyianus* Seen well in the Marcapomacocha area. Here the subspecies *ingae*

Scolopacidae

Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus Seen well at Ventanilla

Wandering Tattler *Tringa incana* Excellent views of this rare migrant on Puerto Viejo beach, while we were looking for the Peruvian Seaside Cinclodes. This was an Eduardo lifer.

Ruddy Turnstone Arenaria interpres Several encounters along the coast

Sanderling Calidris alba Seen well at Ventanilla



Laridae

Andean Gull Chroicocephalus serranus Seen at higher elevations, where it's common

Grey Gull Leucophaeus modestus A large flock was seen at Puerto Viejo beach.

Grey-headed Gull *Chroicocephalus cirrocephalus* Nice views at Pantanos de Villa and Puerto Viejo

Laughing Gull *Leucophaeus atricilla* Two birds were seen floating on the quiet waters at Pantanos de Villa.

Belcher's Gull *Larus belcheri* Common along the cold waters of the Humboldt Current. Named after Sir Edward Belcher, British naval explorer of the Pacific coast of the Americas

Kelp Gull Larus dominicanus A few encounters along the coast

Large-billed Tern Phaetusa simplex Seen in the lowlands

Inca Tern *Larosterna inca* Close-up views of several birds roosting from the stakeout at Pucusana. A truly handsome bird. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Rock Dove Columba livia Too many!

Band-tailed Pigeon *Patagioenas fasciata* Several were seen in the cloudforest below Pillahuata.

Plumbeous Pigeon Patagioenas plumbea Seen well at the Cock of the Rock Lodge

Ruddy Pigeon Patagioenas subvinacea Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

Spot-winged Pigeon *Patagioenas maculosa* Seen well in the Ollantaytambo area and on the upper Manu Road

Pale-vented Pigeon Patagioenas cayennensis Seen in the lowlands

West Peruvian Dove Zenaida meloda The common dove on the western slope of the Andes Eared Dove Zenaida auriculata Numerous at Lomas de Lachay and common at other locations

Ruddy Ground Dove Columbina talpacoti Common around Puerto Maldonado

Picui Ground Dove Columbina picui Seen in Puerto Maldonado

Croaking Ground Dove Columbina cruziana Seen at Lomas de Lachay

Bare-faced Ground Dove Metriopelia ceciliae Seen along the Santa Eulalia Road

White-tipped Dove Leptotila verreauxi Several sightings, especially along the Urubamba River

Grey-fronted Dove Leptotila rufaxilla Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

White-throated Quail-Dove (H) Zentrygon frenata This species was heard in the cloudforest below Rocotal on the Manu Road.

Hoatzin *Opisthocomus hoazin* Seen well at the marsh in Villa Carmen and at the Tambopata National Reserve

CUCULIFORMES

Cuculidae

Smooth-billed Ani *Crotophaga ani* Common in the tropical lowlands

Groove-billed Ani Crotophaga sulcirostris Common on the west slope

Little Cuckoo Coccycua minuta Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Squirrel Cuckoo *Piaya cayana* A few encounters on the lower parts of the Manu Road **STRIGIFORMES**

Strigidae

Tawny-bellied Screech Owl (H) Megascops watsonii Heard at Refugio Amazonas

Tropical Screech Owl (H) Megascops choliba Heard in the lowlands

Yungas Pygmy Owl Glaucidium bolivianum Excellent views below Wayquecha



Pacific Pygmy Owl *Glaucidium peruanum* Good views of one bird along the Santa Eulalia Road

Burrowing Owl Athene cunicularia Great views at Lomas de Lachay

Lyre-tailed Nightjar Uropsalis lyra Brief views of a male above the Cock of the Rock Lodge

Chestnut-collared Swift Streptoprocne rutila Seen above the Cock of the Rock Lodge

White-collared Swift Streptoprocne zonaris Seen in the lowlands

Pale-rumped Swift Chaetura egregia Seen in the lowlands

Grey-rumped Swift Chaetura cinereiventris Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

Neotropical Palm Swift *Tachornis squamata* Several individuals in the lowlands

Rufous-breasted Hermit Glaucis hirsutus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Green Hermit Phaethornis guy Seen around Aguas Calientes

Reddish Hermit Phaethornis ruber Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

White-necked Jacobin Florisuga mellivora Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

Green Violetear Colibri thalassinus Seen at Machu Picchu

Sparkling Violetear *Colibri coruscans* The bully of the hummingbirds. Several encounters

Blue-tailed Emerald Chlorostilbon mellisugus Seen around Puerto Maldonado

Fork-tailed Woodnymph Thalurania furcata Seen in the lowlands

Many-spotted Hummingbird *Taphrospilus hypostictus* Seen at the Cock of the Rock Lodge feeders

Green-and-white Hummingbird (E) *Amazilia viridicauda* Seen in the forest around Puente Ruinas below Machu Picchu

White-bellied Hummingbird Amazilia chionogaster Seen around Ollantaytambo and Aguas Calientes

Amazilia Hummingbird Amazilia amazilia Seen at Lomas de Lachay

Sapphire-spangled Emerald Amazilia lactea Seen around Puerto Maldonado

Speckled Hummingbird Adelomyia melanogenys Seen in the Cock of the Rock Lodge garden

Fawn-breasted Brilliant Heliodoxa rubinoides Seen below Pillahuata

Violet-fronted Brilliant *Heliodoxa leadbeateri* The most common species at the Cock of the Rock Lodge feeders

Chestnut-breasted Coronet *Boissonneaua matthewsii* Seen around Aguas Calientes above the Cock of the Rock Lodge

Mountain Velvetbreast Lafresnaya lafresnayi Brief views above Wayquecha

Amethyst-throated Sunangel Heliangelus amethysticollis Seen at Wayquecha

Booted Racket-tail *Ocreatus underwoodii* Seen at the Cock of the Rock Lodge feeders. Here the buff-booted subspecies *annae*

Black-tailed Trainbearer *Lesbia victoriae* Seen in the gardens of the Pakaritampu hotel in Ollantaytambo

Green-tailed Trainbearer Lesbia nuna Seen around Huacarpay Lake



Bearded Mountaineer (E) *Oreonympha nobilis* A restricted-range species. Excellent views in the garden of the Pakaritampu hotel in Ollantaytambo

Tyrian Metaltail *Metallura tyrianthina* Named for the port of Tyre, today in Lebanon. The city of Tyre was famous for the production of a rare and extraordinarily expensive sort of purple dye, produced from a murex shellfish, known as Tyrian purple. Here the deep bluetailed subspecies *smaragdinicollis*. We saw the subspecies *tyrianthina* in the north.

Shining Sunbeam Aglaeactis cupripennis Seen above Wayquecha

Rufous-capped Thornbill Chalcostigma ruficeps Nice views at Wayquecha

Long-tailed Sylph Aglaiocercus kingii Seen at Rocotal above the Cock of the Rock Lodge

Olivaceous Thornbill *Chalcostigma olivaceum* Great views of one bird in Marcapomacocha **Bronze-tailed Comet** (E) *Polyonymus caroli* Excellent views of this endemic on the upper parts of the Santa Eulalia Road

Oasis Hummingbird *Rhodopis vesper* Seen along the Santa Eulalia Road. A near-endemic species

Purple-collared Woodstar Myrtis fanny Seen along the Santa Eulalia Road

Peruvian Sheartail *Thaumastura cora* Amazing sightings along the Santa Eulalia Road. A near-endemic species

Golden-headed Quetzal *Pharomachrus auriceps* Awesome views of one male above the Cock of the Rock Lodge

Masked Trogon *Trogon personatus* Excellent views of one pair in the cloudforest below Wayquecha

Black-tailed Trogon Trogon melanurus Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

Blue-crowned Trogon Trogon curucui Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

Green-backed Trogon (H) Trogon viridis Heard in the lowlands

CORACIIFORMES

Ringed Kingfisher Megaceryle torquata Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Amazon Kingfisher Chloroceryle amazona Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Momotidae

Andean Motmot *Momotus aequatorialis* Great views at Puente Ruinas below Machu Picchu **Rufous Motmot** *Baryphthengus martii* Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Broad-billed Motmot Electron platyrhynchum

Purus Jacamar *Galbalcyrhynchus purusianus* Seen around Puerto Maldonado. Named after the Purús River, a tributary of the Amazon

White-throated Jacamar *Brachygalba albogularis* Excellent views of this range-restricted species around Puerto Maldonado

Bluish-fronted Jacamar *Galbula cyanescens* Seen at Refugio Amazonas and on the lowest parts of the Manu Road

Paradise Jacamar Galbula dea Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Great Jacamar Jacamerops aureus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Bucconidae

White-necked Puffbird Notharchus hyperrhynchus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Chestnut-capped Puffbird Bucco macrodactylus Seen well at Refugio Amazonas

Striolated Puffbird (H) Nystalus striolatus Heard at Refugio Amazonas

Black-fronted Nunbird Monasa nigrifrons Common in the lowlands

White-fronted Nunbird Monasa morphoeus Seen at Refugio Amazonas



Swallow-winged Puffbird *Chelidoptera tenebrosa* Seen in the lowlands, where it is common along rivers and in open areas

Gilded Barbet Capito auratus Seen around Puerto Maldonado

Versicolored Barbet *Eubucco versicolor* A few sightings around the Cock of the Rock Lodge. Here the nominate subspecies *versicolor*

Ramphastidae

Blue-banded Toucanet *Aulacorhynchus coeruleicinctis* Great views above the Cock of the Rock Lodge

Ivory-billed Toucanet Pteroglossus azara Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Curl-crested Aracari *Pteroglossus beauharnaesii* Awesome views at Refugio Amazonas Golden-collared Toucanet *Selenidera reinwardtii* Seen at Refugio Amazonas. Here the subspecies *langsdorffii*

Channel-billed Toucan Ramphastos vitellinus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

White-throated Toucan Ramphastos tucanus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Grey-breasted Mountain Toucan *Andigena hypoglauca* After a lot of work looking for this bird we were rewarded with crippling views of this species below Wayquecha. The species is classified as a near-threatened.

Picidae

Ocellated Piculet Picumnus dorbignyanus Great views below Machu Picchu

Fine-barred Piculet (E) Picumnus subtilis A pair was seen well at Villa Carmen

Yellow-tufted Woodpecker *Melanerpes cruentatus* One of the most common species in open areas in the tropical lowlands

Little Woodpecker Veniliornis passerinus Seen in the lowlands

Red-stained Woodpecker Veniliornis affinis Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge

Golden-green Woodpecker Piculus chrysochloros Seen in the lowlands

Golden-olive Woodpecker *Colaptes rubiginosus* Two were seen below the Cock of the Rock Lodge.

Lineated Woodpecker Dryocopus lineatus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Crimson-crested Woodpecker *Campephilus melanoleucos* Seen above Atalaya on the lowest parts of the Manu Road

Andean Flicker *Colaptes rupicola* Common at higher elevations

FALCONIFORMES

Black Caracara Daptrius ater Seen in the lowlands

Red-throated Caracara Ibycter americanus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Mountain Caracara *Phalcoboenus megalopterus* Common at higher elevations

Southern Crested Caracara *Caracara plancus* Seen above the open fields of Patria on the lowest parts of the Manu Road

Laughing Falcon (H) Herpetotheres cachinnans Heard at Refugio Amazonas

Bat Falcon Falco rufigularis

Red-and-green Macaw Ara chloropterus Daily views at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge Scarlet Macaw Ara macao Great views at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge Chestnut-fronted Macaw Ara severus Seen well at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge Red-bellied Macaw Orthopsittaca manilatus Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge. This species is associated with the Moriche Palms, which are common around oxbow lakes and swamps in the Amazon.

Blue-headed Macaw *Primolius couloni* Good views of this uncommon species at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge. The species is classified as vulnerable.

White-eyed Parakeet Psittacara leucophthalmus Seen at Refugio Amazonas

Mitred Parakeet *Psittacara mitratus* Scope views at Puente Ruinas below Machu Picchu Dusky-headed Parakeet *Aratinga weddellii* A common species in the Amazon lowlands Black-capped Parakeet *Pyrrhura rupicola* Seen at the Refugio Amazonas Lodge. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Barred Parakeet *Bolborhynchus lineola* A large flock was seen on consecutive days flying above the nightjar stakeout on the Manu Road.

Andean Parakeet Bolborhynchus orbygnesius Only one glimpse of this most-wanted species

Cobalt-winged Parakeet Brotogeris cyanoptera Common in the lowlands

White-bellied Parrot *Pionites leucogaster* This nice-looking parrot was seen at Refugio Amazonas.

Orange-cheeked Parrot *Pyrilia barrabandi* Another handsome parrot seen nicely at Refugio Amazonas. The species is classified as near-threatened.

Blue-headed Parakeet Pionus menstruus Common in the lowlands

Plum-crowned Parakeet Pionus tumultuosus Great views below Machu Picchu

Buff-breasted Earthcreeper *Upucerthia validirostris* Seen well below the Ticlio mountain pass

Peruvian Seaside Cinclodes (E) *Cinclodes taczanowskii* Seen well at Puerto Viejo beach **Cream-winged Cinclodes** *Cinclodes albiventris* Common at higher elevations. This species was split from Bar-winged Cinclodes.

White-bellied Cinclodes (E) *Cinclodes palliatus* Great views of three individuals below the Ticlio mountain pass. This species is listed as critically endangered, with an extremely small population of between 50 and 250 mature individuals.

Rusty-crowned Tit-Spinetail (E) *Leptasthenura pileata* Seen at the upper parts of the Santa Eulalia Road

Streak-backed Tit-Spinetail *Leptasthenura striata* Seen along the Santa Eulalia Road **Plain-crowned Spinetail** *Synallaxis gujanensis* Seen well at Villa Carmen. Here the subspecies *canipileus*, more than one species is probably involved.

Azara's Spinetail *Synallaxis azarae* Seen below Machu Picchu. Named after Felix Manuel de Azara (1746-1811), Spanish officer commanding the Paraguayan border, naturalist and author (*Apuntiamentos para la historia natural de los páxaros de Paraguay y Río de la Plata*, 1805)



Plain Softtail *Tripophaga fusciceps* This vine-loving furnariid was seen at Villa Carmen.

Orange-fronted Plushcrown *Metopothrix aurantiaca* Splendid views at Villa Carmen, where it seems not uncommon

Creamy-crested Spinetail (E) *Cranioleuca albicapilla* Great views of two individuals during our lunch stop at Acjanaco. Here the subspecies *albigula*

Streak-throated Canastero Asthenes humilis Seen in Marcapomacocha

Rusty-fronted Canastero (E) *Asthenes ottonis* It took time, but we had excellent views at Huacarpay Lake.

Cinereous Conebill *Conirostrum cinereum* Seen at Lomas de Lachay, the subspecies *littorale*, and also the nominate subspecies *cinereum* at Huacarpay Lake

Blue-backed Conebill Conirostrum sitticolor Seen at Pillahuata

White-browed Conebill Conirostrum ferrugineiventre Good views of one bird at Acjanaco Capped Conebill Conirostrum albifrons Seen along the Machu Picchu railway not far from Puente Ruinas

Rusty Flowerpiercer Diglossa sittoides Seen at the gardens of the Pakaritampu hotel

Great Inca Finch (E) *Incaspiza pulchra* A family was seen well along the Santa Eulalia Road. There are five species in this genus, all endemic to Peru.

Collared Warbling Finch *Poospiza hispaniolensis* Seen along the Santa Eulalia Road. A near-endemic species

Greenish Yellow Finch Sicalis olivascens A flock was seen along the Santa Eulalia Road.

Bright-rumped Yellow Finch Sicalis uropigyalis Nice views at higher elevations

Raimondi's Yellow Finch (E) *Sicalis raimondii* Splendid views of this seldom-seen nomadic species along the main track at Lomas de Lachay. We had the chance to have scope views of at least 100+ birds feeding on the ground. Named after Antonio Raimondi, a 19th century Italian naturalist, collector and explorer
